Our planned giving campaign and the creation of the Legacy Society was announced at the annual meeting in January by parishioner Mark Durham. In the spring we distributed brochures and sent letters expanding on the subject to the parish. The All Saints Legacy Society was formed to expand the All Saints endowment through the acceptance of estate and planned gifts. The Legacy Society is open to anyone who declares they have made a provision for All Saints Church in their estate plan or planned gift to the endowment. 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They were all of them saints of God

Following their grand wedding at All Saints Church and their memorable beachfront reception at the Felton Cottage on June 30th, 1905, Capt. and Mrs. Smedley D. Butler headed to the Adirondacks in upstate New York for their honeymoon. It wasn't long, though, before Capt. Butler returned to the Marine Corps and resumed his duties.

Butler's service record from 1898 to 1931 is unmatched. He fought in the Spanish-American War in Cuba, the Philippine-American War at Manila, the Boxer Rebellion in China, the Banana Wars in the Caribbean and Central America, and, finally, served in World War I. His decorated service speaks for itself. In July 1900 1st Lt. Butler was awarded the Marine Corps Brevet Medal "for distinguished conduct and public service in the presence of the enemy . . . near Tientsin, China." In April 1914, then-Major Butler would receive the first of his two Medals of Honor. The citation reads "For distinguished conduct in battle, engagement of Vera Cruz, 22 April 1914. Major Butler was eminent and conspicuous in command of his battalion. He exhibited courage and skill in leading his men through the action of the 22d and in the final occupation of the city."

Before the smoke cleared from battles in Mexico, Butler and his Marines were sent to intervene in Haiti after the assassination of the Haitian President. Butler took command of the Haitian military police force fighting against the armed insurgents. It was here on 17 November 1915 where Major Butler earned his second Medal of Honor for conspicuous bravery during the successful assault on the insurgents' stronghold. Smedley Butler is the only member of the U.S. Marine Corps to earn the Brevet Medal and two Medals of Honor.

In 1918 Brigadier General Butler was assigned to Camp Pontanezen at Brest, France, a debarkation depot that funneled troops of the American Expeditionary Force to the battlefields. At the time of his assignment, the camp was unsanitary, overcrowded and disorganized. In short order he "solved all (the problems) with conspicuous success, performing services of the highest character of the American Expeditionary Forces." These words appeared in the citations accompanying the Army and Navy Distinguished Service Medals he was awarded. After the war he was assigned to the Marine Barracks at Marine Corps Base Quantico, Virginia. During his tenure there he transformed the wartime training camp into the permanent Marine Corps post it is today.

After retiring from the Marines Butler became an outspoken critic of the business of war. He wrote in his book *War Is a Racket* "I served in all commissioned ranks from second lieutenant to Major General. And during that period I spent most of my time being a high-class muscle-man for Big Business, for Wall Street and for the bankers. In short, I was a racketeer for capitalism. I suspected I was just part of the racket all the time. Now I am sure of it." Raised in a Quaker family, he came to see his service, particularly in Central America and China, as nothing short of protecting the financial interests of the wealthiest corporations in America.

Along the way, Smedley and Ethel raised three children: Ethel (b1906), Smedley Junior (b1909) and Thomas (b1913). Smedley Senior died on June 21, 1940, at the U.S. Naval Hospital in Philadelphia; Ethel died on June 15, 1962 in Newtown Square, PA.
