# Outreach Project . . . .

On Saturday, June 16, Otto Lowe and Phyllis Kata attended the 13th annual Celebration of Platinum Dads. Reminding us that the first Father's Day in the US was celebrated June 19, 1920, Family Partners awarded 13 fathers, on the eve of Father's Day, for being extraordinary dads. They were nominated by family members, co-workers, or civic associates and each spoke a few words as they received their awards. They spoke movingly of their own fathers and their relationships with their children. One spoke of losing a son to mental illness. Fatherhood is hard work, one reminded us that just because you are born on 3rd base doesn't mean you hit a triple. Another told of his 15 year old daughter who wanted to marry someone just like her dad. Why? She told him he went to work every day, he never raised a hand to her mother, AND he washed the dishes. The MC of the event gave every dad an assignment for the following day, Father's Day. Each dad was to write down and share with his partner and children 20 reasons why he loved them. The last dad to speak was one completing the Family Partners program and he spoke of "the process". Each step he took in accepting and finishing the program was one piece of "the process" to finally being a self-sustaining father to his family, the goal of Family Partners.

# They were all of them saints of God\*

The following announcement appeared in The New York Times on July 1, 1905:

"BAY HEAD, N.J., June 30.- Capt. Smedley Darlington Butler, United States Marine Corps, whom President Roosevelt recently designated as the ideal American soldier, was married to Miss Ethel Conway Peters of Philadelphia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peters, who are spending the Summer here. The ceremony was performed in All Saints Episcopal Church by the Rev. Dr. George Christian of New York. A large body of marines in uniform attended."

The article went on to name all the members of the wedding party, every one of whom appears in the beautiful



painting by Dick LaBonte shown here. The painting, done in 1984, is titled *The Wedding by the Sea*. The beachfront home is that of Ethel's maternal grand-father, Samuel Morse Felton. The house was known locally as the "Felton Cottage," and it sat on the northeast corner of East Avenue and Harris Street. Felton built the "cottage" in the late 1800s as his summer residence, and he often travelled to Bay Head by rail in his private car which he parked on a siding near the Bay Head Station. Felton was a well-known railroad company executive who, among

other positions he held, was president of the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad from 1851 to the end of the Civil War in 1865. While president of PWBRR he was instrumental in foiling a plot in February 1861 to assassinate Abraham Lincoln a week before his inauguration.

Working with Allan Pinkerton, who later established a detective agency bearing his name, Felton was convinced that southern secessionists were plotting to kill Lincoln as he made his way from Springfield, Illinois to Washington ahead of his inauguration. In mid-February Pinkerton discovered the so-called Baltimore Plot while working undercover. The plotters intended to kill Lincoln as he changed trains in Baltimore. Although Lincoln was told of the plot, he insisted on continuing with his travel plans. His wife then intervened and demanded that Lincoln go along with Felton and Pinkerton's plan to disguise Lincoln and have him travel by a different train to Washington. Felton took care of the train and Lincoln was delivered safely to Washington several days ahead of schedule.

Ethel's paternal grandfather was also a famous railroad man by the name of Richard Peters. He was a contemporary of Felton, but Peters' career led him south to Georgia to oversee the building of a railroad from Augusta to new town named Marthasville. Peters was instrumental in changing the town's name to something shorter to write in shippers' log books. In December 1845 the new town became Atlanta.
